HRELP

- established in 2002 with a commitment from Arcadia Trust of £20 million
- general goal: to document as many endangered languages as possible and to encourage the development of relevant skills across the world
- consists of three independent but collaborating programmes:
 - Endangered Languages Academic Programme
 - Endangered Languages Archive
 - Endangered Languages Documentation Programme

ELAP

- Directed by Peter K. Austin
- Postgraduate teaching and research and post-doctoral fellowships on theory and practice of:
 - language documentation and description
 - language support and revitalisation
- goal: to develop knowledge and skills of current practitioners and to train the next generation of language documenters
- currently 17 MA and 12 PhD students (5 graduated already)
- comprehensive programme of public lectures, exhibitions, EL Week, seminars, workshops, conferences
- publication: Language Documentation and Description

ELAR

Directed by David Nathan

state of the art digital archive which catalogues, stores and makes accessible material from grantees, research students and others (currently 50 deposits, 4Tbytes)

- in collaboration with ELAP and external specialists offers training courses and advice on preparation of projects and long-term preservation
- member of DELAMAN
- operates specialist research laboratory (Rausing Room) equipped for preparing documentation, sound and video materials

ELDP

- Directed by Peter Sells (interim Director)
- offers up to £1 million in grants each year (until 2016) for documentation of ELs
- 4 grant types: small (up to £10,000), PhD scholarships, post-doc fellowships, major projects (up to £150,000)
- already awarded 200 grants to teams working across the world
- governed by an international panel (Chair: Andrew Spencer, Essex) who decide grants, awards are administered by SOAS






Advice

Project design and set up (eg. equipment recommendations)

- Review and recommendations on sample outputs
- On-going advice on archiving and publication
- Provision of tailor-made solutions, eg. conversion of files, creation of XSLT stylesheets (subject to resources)

 AD-MD05b 24Deic Phonetic Variation way quality


AD-MD05b 34Peje Phonetic Variation.wav - quality quite good. Stereo separation of voices is nice.




Infrastructure

- Flexible metadata system, with rich access and use protocols implementation
- Data publication and distribution portal (from December 2009)




The Hans Rausing Endangered Languages Project

- The Academic Programme (ELAP) runs postgraduate programmes in Field Linguistics and Language Documentation and Description
- The Documentation Programme (ELDP) provides grants for language documentation
- The Archive Programme (ELAR) archives language documentation and provides technical training
