BABEL

let endangered languages change linguistics

and our ideas about language, culture and cognition

because

- majority of the world's 6000 languages, both spoken and signed, are disappearing or becoming more like the languages of wider communication
- majority of the world's languages are not described and our knowledge is geographically biased

and because

- several documentation initiatives have produced new data
- these data have not yet had sufficient influence on our thinking about language

Main purpose

- promote empirical research on underdescribed endangered languages,
- both spoken and signed,
- that aims at changing and refining our ideas about linguistic structure in general.
- strengthening data collection by introducing new researchers to this field

thus

- our ideas about language are based on a small subset of the world's languages
- there are new categories, structures to be found
- and our ideas about what is common and what is rare are heavily biased

Why now

- Developments within society of linguists are promising for fieldwork linguistics
- Possibility of attracting substantially more linguists to work on these languages
- Goal: change of attitude among linguists, integration of empirical and theoretical approach

new situation

- where the need is felt to present new insights for the wider scientific community
- where more scholars become familiar with analysis of primary language data and contribute to it
- where scholars can use the endangered languages of their country as an asset, also for their careers *

Dissemination

- engage scholars generally and not restricting to those working on endangered languages:
- via existing general conferences
- publication in mainstream journals

Networking

- build networks for topics across language families and areas from within the BABEL theme
- organise training where researchers from all backgrounds meet

What can BABEL projects achieve

- realise the goals for their topic
- strengthen each other's topics
- think about impact on scientific community
- think about image and appreciation of fieldwork related research in linguistic community
