1) Summary

The 5th Biennial Conference of Experimental Pragmatics was held at the University of Utrecht, Netherlands. The Network was designed to support the biennial Experimental Pragmatics conferences, now known as XPRAG, that began to take shape with a conference in Cambridge (2005). These are 3-day long conferences with invited speakers plus papers and posters accepted through evaluations by a reviewing committee.

This edition was sponsored by the ESF research network EURO-XPRAG. The conference took place from Wednesday, September 4 to Friday, September 6, from 9:30 to 19:00 (17:00 the last day).
