#### Research Steering Committee (RSC)

The two theme-specific Research Steering Committees (RSC) are established once trans-national Collaborative Research Projects have commenced their funded research within each respective HERA JRP theme. RSCs are composed of Project Leaders of funded projects but can also co-opt external scientific experts and non-academic experts. Representatives of the Knowledge Transfer Advisory Committee may take part in the meetings of the RSCs. The chairs are selected from amongst the committees' membership.

The main task of RSCs is providing scientific guidance and coordination and initiating scientific networking, dissemination and knowledge transfer activities for the two JRPs in keeping with the strategy developed by the Knowledge Transfer Advisory Committee.

#### **Knowledge Transfer Advisory Committee (KTAC)**

KTAC consists of five members of the HERA JRP Board, two non-academic stakeholders and two senior science administrators. Prof. Shearer West (AHRC) is the Chair of the KTAC. The secretarial support is provided by AHRC and the HERA JRP Handling Agency. The responsibilities of KTAC are the following:

- To develop and update the HERA JRP Knowledge Transfer Strategy
- To cluster and steer projects towards possible synergies (e.g. cluster by the type of main stakeholders; by certain area)
- To facilitate networking
- Decision making on proposals for KT activities from specific projects
- To monitor plans of networking and knowledge exchange activities of those funded projects which will get extra funding, spread good practices and assess impact of those activities.
