1) Summary (up to one page)

The annual Transfer of Knowledge Conference (TKC) is the major activity within the ESF Research Network Programme ESCON 2. The conference took place in Vilnius, Lithuania, August 27-September 1, 2013. The total number of participants was 105 including Steering Committee members and Key-notes. The conference was jointly organized by Department of Psychology of Mykolas Romeris University and Lithuanian Psychological Association. The main goal of the Conference was to provide a forum for the transfer of knowledge in Social Cognition for over 100 junior and senior researchers (Ratio 77/23). Specifically, this conference is designed to facilitate knowledge transfer regarding new scientific advances, supporting the training of new generation of scientists in Social Cognition. The Conference provided a platform for the transfer of knowledge and training, promotion, and networking of PhD students in social cognition, and we believe facilitated the development of novel theoretical and empirical syntheses that will lead to groundbreaking research. Each junior presenter gave a 20 min presentation in one of the 18 thematic sessions chaired by senior convener followed by a 10 min exchange and discussion session. Additionally, the 2013 TKC included pre-conference workshop on social neuroscience, with 5 key-note speakers and concluding discussion, moderated by Frank Van Overwalle and Klaus Fiedler. The pre-conference was well attended by junior also as senior researchers. In addition the 2013 TKC included 4 “State of the Art” lectures by renewed experts in Social Cognition and related fields, which offered expert overviews of a particular topic or an integration with other related disciplines. The key note speakers invited to the 2013 TKC in Vilnius were Melanie Steffens (University of Koblenz-Landau, Germany), Olivier Corneille (Catholic University of Luvain, Belgium), Christina Unkelbach (University of Cologne, Germany), and Dominique Muller (University of Grenoble Alpes, France). A plenary session was also dedicated to the presentation of the research from this year’s winner of the Best Paper Award. During the conference, Workshop “Strong Social Cognition -- How to Improve the Quality of Scientific Research” was convened by Klaus Fiedler & Leonel Garcia-Marques.

2) Description of the scientific content of and discussions at the event (up to four pages)

First, Pre-conference on Social Neuroscience addressed interdisciplinary topics, aiming to facilitate the interaction between neuroscience and social cognition fields and researchers. Robin Dunbar talk about the Evolution and the Social Brain; Cecilia Heyes presented the lecture titled “ Mirror Neurons: From Origins to Function”, Ian Apperly talked about Controlled and Automatic Mindreading in Children and Adults, Claus Lamm addressed issues of Empathy, Prosocial and Moral Behavior. Karin Roelofs addressed Neuroendocrine Mechanisms of Social Behavior.

The pre-conference ended with a lively Debate with all speakers on the topic “ Does Social Neuroscience Contribute to social cognition? (Discussant: Klaus Fiedler, Moderator: Frank Van Overwalle).

Next, during the TKC, 18 parallel thematic sessions were organized. The complete program of the meeting can be found at the end of this document. During the selection process of the participants, also as during the planning of the thematic sessions we aimed to cover most of the major themes in Social Cognition research.

An invited senior expert convened each parallel session. The convener’s role was to coordinate the discussion stimulated by each work. Each participant presented his/her work in 20 minutes talk, followed by 10 minutes period for feedback, questions and debate.

The Keynotes gave an integrated overview of their cumulative work, which constitute central topics in current social cognition research.

As a new innovation for the TKC, Workshop "Strong Social Cognition -- How to Improve the Quality of Scientific Research" was convened by Klaus Fiedler & Leonel Garcia-Marques. The Workshop addressed the current debate on the reliability, quality, and usability of scientific results entails an unfortunate and potentially dangerous confound of fraud, voodoo correlations, and questionable research practices. As social cognition has been the focus of several hassles (Stapel, Smeesters, Sanna, Bargh, Bem), tackling this debate on an ESCON meeting seems to be a timely and appropriate goal. The central assumption underlying the "Strong social cognition" workshop is that defensive strategies to re-establish the image of social cognition and the replicability of specific findings (like priming) would be inappropriate means of improving the quality of behavioral research. Instead, the aim of the podium discussion is to instigate a constructive debate that focuses on strong science, exemplified by a "hall of fame" for good science in social cognition, as opposed to a witch hunt after cheaters or a surveillance system for discovering examples of bad science. To elicit an open discussion among all ESCON participants, the introductory statements of the following active participants emphasized the importance of clearly spelled-out theories, open controversies, methodological training, and the crucial role of trust in the scientific community: Olivier Corneille, Klaus Fiedler, Leonel Garcia-Marques, Gideon Keren, Christoph Stahl.

3) Assessment of the results and impact of the event on the future directions of the field (up to two pages)

The most beneficial activities for junior researchers was the opportunity to exchange ideas regarding the research design, result analysis and interpretation of the results. Moreover, the conference provided a unique venue for young researchers to present their research in thematic sessions and to receive feedback from their peers, but also from more senior researchers and leading experts in the field of social cognition

The conference provided ample opportunity for interpersonal contact and exchange ideas and knowledge between diverse researchers across different European countries. As such, we hope that this conference inspired lab-visits and created new collaborative networks among researchers, both junior and more senior. The social program and the informal exchanges during meals and in leisure time were also arranged in the way that would facilitated the interaction.

Finally the increased participation of colleagues from Lithuania as member country was notable (6 junior researchers have participated). Previously, Lithuania was represented by single junior researcher in previous TKC. This shows, as an example, that arranging TKC in less developed country in the sense of the status of the field of social cognition is very beneficial and help new scholars to emerge and join existing research networks in the field.
