##### Basic intention

The conference undertook a first attempt of comparison the Habsburg residences between 1400 and 1700 in Spain, the Spanish Netherlands and Central Europe. The pivot was the question of a dynastic identity of the House of Habsburg and of its manifestation in the culture of residences. Under the assumption, the development of this identity would oscillate between the European dimension of the House on the one side and the local and regional ones on the other, a special attention was given to the following interdisciplinary questions: "Repraesentatio majestatis" and residency –

Religious practice and court – Habsburg and Muslims – Regional patriotism (Landespatriotismus)

## 2. DESCRIPTION OF THE SCIENTIFIC CONTENT OF AND DISCUSSION AT THE EVENT

Various visual and written sources survived prove that the members of the House of Habsburg devoted special attention to creation of their 'dynastic identity' (e.g. "Fürstenspiegel", panegyric and emblematic literature). The conference traced a Habsburg dynastic 'idiom' in the sphere of archducal / kingly / imperial representation, which took place chiefly at the residence courts, and to specify its supranational features in contrast to regional ones.

Court culture in Vienna, Madrid, Brussels, Prague, Preßburg, Budapest and other residences have been examined and compared – with a double focus on looking for interdependencies / interactions: within the Habsburg family spread over Europe and with local traditions, in which Habsburg courts have been implanted (e.g. in the capital cities of the "Erblande").

Important topics of exchange and interaction have been worked out with help of the visual media, used by the Habsburgs, and have been developed in four panels:

### **"Repraesentatio majestatis" and residency**

The residence court seen as the nucleus of representation: Investigation was focused not only on the model of official apartment created by the Habsburgs in relation to court ceremony. The papers handled also residence-projects e.g. in Innsbruck, Vienna, Prague or Madrid and took a look at the multiple identities and political strategies of the Casa Austria in the field of Arts.

### **Imperial, royal or princely identity and Regional patriotism**

The Habsburgs developed a supranational form of dynastic identity. Beside that however there were other forms of identities articulated and cultivated by the local nobles in Bohemia, Hungary, and Poland. They related namely to what may be called *Landespatriotismus*. Therefore speeches and discussion have been engaged in various forms of expression of *Landespatriotismus* in the visual arts dedicated to the palaces of the time. The main topics have been: regional identities, Hungarian and Bohemian medieval traditions, imperial mythology and the importance of Austrian and Spanish Habsburgs for the Polish kingdom.

### **Religious practice and court**

A decisive element of dynastic identity of the Habsburgs was what might be called "Pietas Austriaca" (Adoration of Eucharist, of the holy Mary, the holy cross and the saints). In which way these specific religious practices became visible either in publicly performed liturgy or in private devotion? In terms of art history this question meant:

Are these practices reflected in culture and architecture at court? The answers developed new points of view. The Pietas Austriaca seen as a political myth and an instrument of dynastic strategy was discussed with examples Italy, Vienna, Madrid, Burgundy or Lisbon.

### **Habsburg and Muslims**

The long standing threat of the Ottomans in eastern Central Europe and the Moors in Spain brought forward the construction of images and stereotypes of the enemies in faith. The decisive question was: Are there to be found similar strategies creating Habsburg propaganda of "defender of faith" in Spain and Austria – in particular context of court culture? Research took place different fields, like the iconography of Suleiman and Charles V, the botanic exchange of the Ottoman and the Habsburg courts, the Turkish elements in theatre and festivities or the impact of Islamic arts on the Spanish Habsburgs.

### **3. RESULTS AND IMPACT OF THE EVENT**

The conference has been organized as the main part of the "Working Party 2: Habsburg Spheres: exchanges and influences?" of the ESF-RNP "PALATIUM. Court Residences as Place of Exchange in Late Medieval and Early Modern Europe (1400-1700)" ([www.courtresidences.eu](http://www.courtresidences.eu)).

The conference and its contents have been developed:

1. In awareness of the aims and topics of the scientific workshop "Felix Austria. Family Ties, Political, Culture and Artistic Patronage between Habsburg Court networks in European Context (1516 – 1715)", organized by the Fundación Carlos de Amberes (FCA) in relation to PALATIUM in Madrid, 30 Nov. – 2 Dec. 2010.
2. In close cooperation with the Austrian Research project (settled in the ÖAW) dedicated to the Viennese Hofburg, especially to part 2: "1519 – 1521/22. Die Residenzen der Renaissance und des Frühbarock. Die Wiener Hofburg im 16. und 17. Jahrhundert. Bau- und Planungsgeschichte, Funktion und Bedeutung"; the team leader (Herbert Karner) and the main collaborator (Renate Holzschuh-Hofer) were part of the conference – as organizer respectively speaker.
