### **FINAL SCIENTIFIC REPORT**

## **DESCRIPTION OF THE EVENT**

Inventories constitute a fundamental source for the study of courtly life and the spaces in which it took place. Plans and the buildings that have survived allow us to study the materiality of the spaces and their organization. Descriptions of ceremonies, banquets and receptions can be combined with the knowledge of those spaces to complete it and provide a more thorough understanding of their functioning.

Inventories add an additional layer to complete the picture. They are fundamental for reconstructions of the interior decoration of palaces on special, celebratory occasions, as well as in everyday life situations. They can provide information on the types of objects, the terminology used, their materials and colors, their shapes and their values, their location inside the palace, their function, and sometimes even about who offered them and on which occasion. Inventories can be a priceless source for the construction of historical knowledge.

This workshop focused on the methodological problems raised by inventories as sources for the analysis of space in courtly contexts. Questions addressed included the following: How are inventories organized, and according to which criteria? Do different organizational choices affect the way they can be used to study space? What is the nomenclature used in relation to space and what are the problems it raises? What types of information do inventories offer; do they mention the scale and placement of the objects, their materials, color, decoration, prices, origin, or author; do they contain information on mechanisms of acquisition and donation; does this add to our understanding of space? How can the data be treated; is an Excel spreadsheet sufficient, or is a database a more effective approach? And if so, are there “best practices” that have been tested and proven, and that should be followed? In short, how can inventories help us reconstruct courtly spaces and their organization?

The workshop was organized in two parts. In the first, called *Problems and Questions*, speakers prepared materials for discussion, which were circulated before the workshop. These comprised excerpts of one or several inventories, or a selection of entries that raised pertinent issues. A presentation of the selected material was followed by a longer discussion led by the speaker. The second part, called *Case Studies*, consisted of 20-minute presentations from doctoral and post-doctoral researchers on inventory-based projects, followed by a shorter discussion period.

## **STRATEGY - CONNECTIONS WITH OTHER PALATIUM EVENTS**

“Inventories and courtly spaces” is one of a series of workshops organized by Palatium designed to cover several theoretical aspects that the Scientific Committee identified as fundamental for the study of court life and its residences. The first one, “Material resources for early modern court history. Art, text and space” took place in 2010, in Brussels. Two others were organized devoted to design tools for the study of court residences, especially focusing on 3D reconstructions: “Virtual palaces, part I and II”, in Leuven (2011) and Munich (2012). Sintra’s workshop was followed by the latter (Munich 2012) and the series is meant to proceed in Stockholm with a workshop devoted to ordinances and court protocol. These meetings should cover all the major theoretical and methodological aspects of the study of court residences that have been identified.

## **RESULTS AND IMPACT OF THE EVENT**

“Inventories and courtly spaces” was organized in conjunction with the “D. Teodósio de Bragança” project of the Centro de História de Além-Mar (CHAM) of the Universidade Nova de Lisboa. This is a large research project financed by ESF-member (and Palatium-funder) Fundação para a Ciência e Tecnologia, devoted to the study of the inventory of the duke of Braganza, D. Teodósio I (d. 1563). Funds from this project were used to co-finance the event. Members of the project presented their work as part of the workshop. The workshop thus contributed not only to the polishing of the project’s conclusions but also to the dissemination of its results. An immediate, palpable result of this interaction was that a Bragança-project member presented the team’s work of 3D reconstruction of the ducal palace in the Munich workshop.

This event was planned as a small, very technical workshop with a few people sitting in a small room. It turned out to have a spectacular outcome that somewhat changed the nature of the event itself, which became much more impactful than anticipated. The workshop was massively attended by staff from most national palaces, museums, research centers and foundations from several parts of the country. The audience included faculty from various universities high schools as well as students at various levels (from high school to graduate and post-graduate). (detailed list attached)

## **PARTICIPANTS AND AUDIENCE**

This workshop involved a keynote speaker (the closing keynote speaker, Fernando Checa, had to cancel at the last minute; Bernardo Garcia Garcia gracefully presented his contribution), 14 senior speakers, and 7 junior speakers. Presenters were asked to chair the sessions.

One hundred and twenty-four (124) people registered coming from national palaces, museums, research centers and foundations from several parts of the country. The audience also included faculty from various universities high schools as well as students at various levels (list attached).
